that had failed, and there was now a better prospect of turnips and potatoes. A letter from Norwich, of August 10th, says that the only damage then apprehended to the grain, in the counties of Hertford, Bedford, Tynningdon, Cambridge, Suffolk and Essex, was that it would sprout in the ear. Little had been done in the houses. Accounts from Gloucester and Manchester of the same nature were to the same effect, and it is probable that the dry weather which ensued, rendered the damage to British crops, and the alarm to British ports, of no great importance.
